Contextualization

 - a. For learning to happen, you have to start where people are
 - b. **Examples**: website development and coding, medical terms, theological terms

Compare and contrast Paul's messages in Acts 13 and 17

- 1. Who is he speaking to?
- 2. What does he assume about his audience?
- 3. Where does he start?
- 4. Who or what does he quote?
- 5. How does the audience respond?

Differences?

Acts 13 - Antioch of Pisidia	Acts 17 - Athens
Quotes Scripture (OT) - Psalms, 1 Samuel, Isaiah, and Habakkuk	Quotes secular (Greek) authors/poets - Epimenides and Aratus
Shows from OT that Jesus is the Messiah	Shows God's attributes (omnipresence) and his role as Creator
Starts with the Hebrew patriarchs and follows that thread all the way to Jesus	Establishes that there is a God who created everything, and that he will judge all people at some point in the future
Mentions the OT law in passing (13:38-39)	Does not mention the OT law, though he does mention "repentance"

Similarities?

- 1. Both audiences are unsaved, unregenerate
- 2. Repentance (13:38-40; 17:30)
- 3. Judgment (13:38-39, 46; 17:31)
- 4. Resurrection (13:30-37; 17:31)
- 5. Both conclude with Jesus
- 6. Response? Some rejected (mocked), some wanted to hear more, some believed.
