Observation and exposition

- 1. Review
 - a. Who was right in the disagreement between Paul and Barnabas about Mark? Paul, Barnabas, both, neither? What good came out of it?
- 2. Read the passage [SLIDES]
- 3. Observation and exposition
 - a. Derbe (1)
 - i. The turn-around point of the first missionary journey.
 - b. Lystra (1)
 - What happened to Paul the last time he was in Lystra? (Or second to last time, technically.)
 - 1. He was stoned by the crowds and left for dead (14:19)
 - 2. But Paul and Barnabas returned to Lystra shortly after that, strengthening and encouraging the disciples.
 - 3. One of those disciples was...Timothy!
 - c. Timothy (1-3)
 - i. What do we know about Timothy?
 - 1. A disciple (of whom? Jesus)
 - a. Converted when?
 - i. Presumably when Paul and Barnabas had been here before - see 1 Corinthians 4:17
 - ii. The "C" word 9 Marks article!
 - One of the Dirtiest Words Today: C——n
 (https://www.9marks.org/article/one-dirtiest-words-today-c-n/)
 - 2. Mother was a Jew
 - 3. Father was a Greek (Gentile)
 - 4. He was "well spoken of by the brothers at Lystra and Iconium"
 - a. Why Lystra?

- i. His hometown, apparently
- b. Why Iconium?
 - i. It was close (see the map)
- c. Why?
- 5. He was not circumcised
- 6. With a Greek father and a Jewish mother, what does that make Timothy? Jew or Greek?
 - a. Discuss
 - b. "By Jewish law Timothy was a Jew, because he was the son of a Jewish mother, but because he was uncircumcised he was technically an apostate Jew. If Paul wished to maintain his links with the synagogue, he could not be seen to countenance [endorse] apostasy." Bruce, 304
- 7. Was Paul, who wrote the letter to the Galatians, being inconsistent by circumcising Timothy? Why or why not?
 - a. Discuss
 - i. 1 Corinthians 9:20 [SLIDE]
 - ii. Bruce quote [SLIDE]
 - iii. The difference was cultural, and not salvific; in other words: the motive behind the action
 - b. Read Bruce (*Paul*), 213-216
- d. They delivered to the churches the message (letter) from the Jerusalem council (4)
 - i. Letter summary [SLIDE]
 - ii. Who was that letter addressed to? Does it apply beyond those areas?
- e. The churches were strengthened in the faith (5)
 - i. Paul's, and therefore Luke's, understanding of evangelism: pastoral oversight, teaching, encouraging, growing, discipling
 - ii. "Once again, Luke makes the important point that resolution of doctrinal and practical issues in the churches promoted the work of the gospel and led to rapid growth." Peterson, 452
